 - g) Comment on Jyoti's 'independent ways' before she became the victim of partition?

 - j) Where was Toba Tek Singh lying at the end of the story?

- 2. Answer any **four** from the following questions: $5 \times 4=20$
 - a) Explain the metaphor of 'house' in the story, 'Alam's Own House' by Dibyendu Palit.
 - b) "Am I weak just because I'm a woman?" Delineate Mallika's character in the light of her question in Manik Bandopadhyay's 'The Final Solution'.
 - c) 'A Leaf in the Storm' foregrounds the female body as a site for political and sexual contest. Do you agree? Give reasons for your answer.
 - d) How does Lalithambika Antharjanam's story narrate the trauma of 'reclaimed' women in the refugee camp during partition?
 - e) How did the inmates of the asylum react when the news of the exchange reached there in Manto's story?
 - f) The poetic voice in Faiz Ahmed Faiz's 'For Your Lanes, My Country' spells out the note of hope amidst darkness and tyranny. Do you agree? Elucidate.
 - g) Critically comment on the intertextual dialogue between Gulzar's poem, 'Toba Tek Singh' and Manto's story of the same title.
 - h) Locate and annotate:

"This is how people fight oppression, their ritual isn't new, nor are my ways new."
